

ELWOOD SAMUEL BAILEY    Died at age 36    1859 - 1895

Died, at the Maine Central House, Lisbon Falls, ME, Third month 30th day 1895, Ellwood S. Bailey, of Durham, a member and elder of Durham Monthly Meeting, aged 36 years. He was employed in the woollen mills at that place and while in the act of oiling a shaft which revolved 85 times per minute, he caught his frock on a set screw, and in an instant he was whirling around the shaft. One leg and one arm were completely shattered. The back of his head thrust and his body badly mangled, but the miraculous seems to be that he should retain his senses and speech until near his death, which occurred in four hours during which time he did not seem to think of his suffering, but his whole theme seemed to be to beseech his fellow work-men and his doctors to be ready for their final change. He said he was ready to go and be with his Saviour, and he wanted everybody to believe he lived the life of a devoted Christian and died in the triumphs of faith. He left a beloved wife and 3 young children. His wife is the daughter of Cyrus Cartland. The funeral was one of the largest ever held in town, twelve ministers being present including, Friends, Free Will Baptists, Baptists, and Methodists.

Her love to her family was only surpassed by her love to her Master and a lifelong desire to bring a Christian influence to all children whom she loved to gather about her. 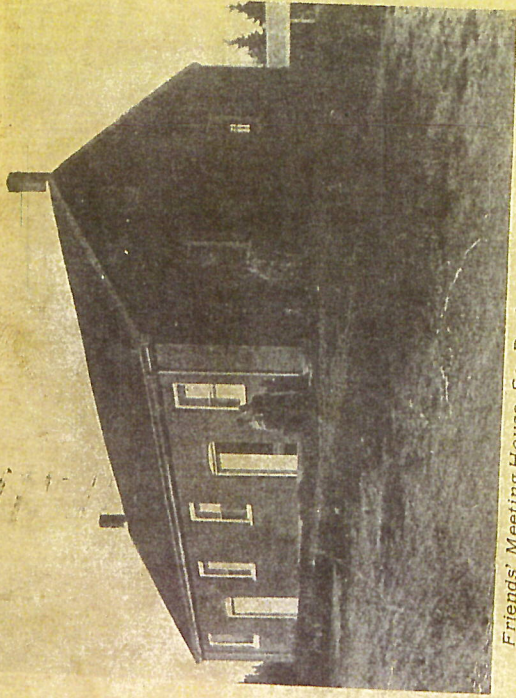

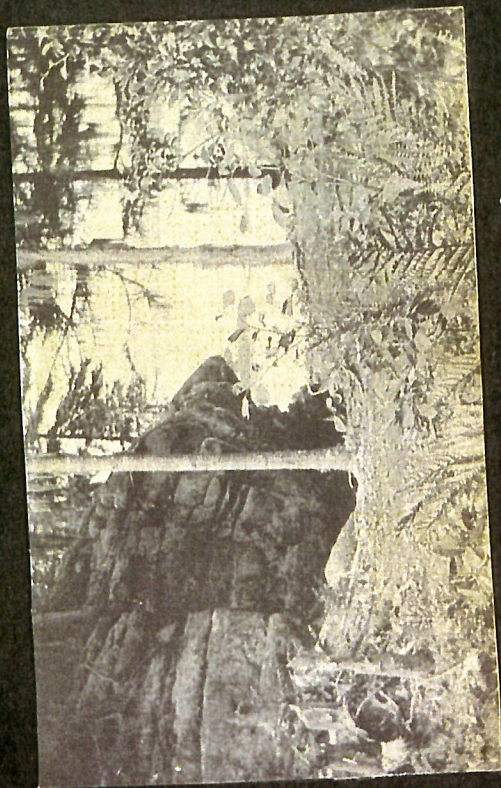

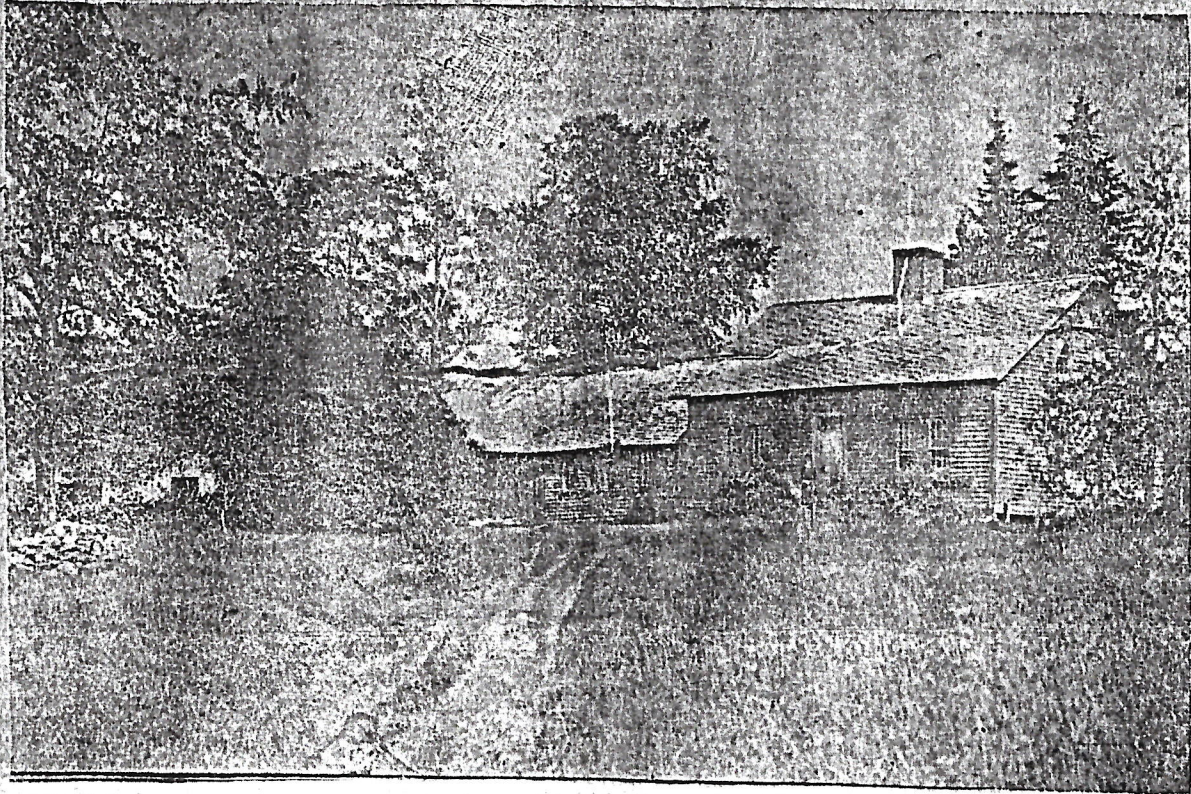

Lucy resides in the same home where she was born and where she was married to the late William Graham in the sunny bay window in the living room or parlor as it was called so long ago, her daughter Ruth, also a retired teacher resides with her mother.

Mrs. Graham was graduated from Lisbon Falls High School and from Farmington State Normal School. She taught school for a number of years in Auburn, Brunswick and Durham.

One amusing story she told was about a large boy who was in her school. "Then you know," she said, "we had all grades in one room. This boy thought he would be a little clownish this day. He had quite long hair and with his hands he made the hair all ruffed up on his head, thinking perhaps, teacher would say something about it. Al the children were wathing to see what would happen. It was near the close of the school day, so when the pupils were leaving, I just said, "good night" to them and never noticed what he had done. So it just took the pompous fellow down a bit and he never tried any tricks again."

changes she says in her long life, from kerosene lamps to electricity, horse drawn vehicles to cars and trucks. Roads weren't plowed in the winter, they were just rolled with logs in front of horse drawn sleds, electric cars, stream-lined trains, airplanes, radio and television.

One thrilling experience she had when she was just a young lady and going to high school in Lisbon Falls was crossing the river on floating logs. This was the only way to cross for some-time.

The underpinning of the old bridge, in the area where the bridge is now between Lisbon Falls and Durham was condemn-
