Evelyn M. Bailey

BRUNSWICK — Evelyn M. Bailey, 95, of 24 B Pejepscot Terrace, died Thursday, July 26, 1990, at a local hospital. She was a longtime librarian.

Born in Lewiston, July 4, 1895, she was the daughter of William A. and Olive Butler Bailey. She graduated from Brunswick High School in 1912 and from Bates College in 1921. She received a bachelor of arts degree in library science from Columbia University in 1929.

Miss Bailey taught school for six years and was employed as a librarian at Queens Borough Public Library from 1929 to 1960. She moved to Brunswick at the time of her retire-

ment.

She was a member of Durham Friends Meeting, the Brunswick Evergreens, Loyalty Club and the Women's Society of the United Methodist Church.

Surviving her are a brother, William H. Bailey of Brunswick; and several nieces, nephews, grandnieces and grandnephews.

Three sisters, Martha Bailey, Mary Bailey and Ruth Watson, died previously.

A graveside service will be held at Lunt Cemetery at a date to be announced by the Brackett Funeral Home.

Dear Friends,

On July 26th, Evelyn Bailey passed away rather peacefully. Soon after her 95th birthday, she complained of abdominal pain which her doctor had not diagnosed. On Monday evening she fainted and fell, but seemed to be recovering in the hospital. After supper on Wednesday, she had a severe pain and her blood pressure dropped rapidly.
